Borders may change, Sindh may return to India: Rajnath

‘Today, the land of Sindh may not be a part of India, but civilisationally, it will always be a part of India. And as far as land is concerned, borders can change’

NEW DELHI

The Sindh region may not be with India today, but borders can change and the region may return to India, said Defence Minister Rajnath Singh. Addressing an event in the national capital on Sunday, Singh said, “...Today, the land of Sindh may not be a part of India, but civilisationally, Sindh will always be a part of India. And as far as land is concerned, borders can change. Who knows, tomorrow Sindh may return to India again...”

The Sindh province, the area near the Indus River, went to Pakistan following Partition in 1947, and the Sindhi people who lived in that region came to India.

The Minister further said Sindhi Hindus, especially from the generation of leaders like LK Advani, have never



accepted the separation of Sindh region from India. “I’d also like to mention that Lal Krishna Advani wrote in one of his books that Sindhi Hindus, especially those of his generation, still haven’t accepted the separation of

‘PoK will merge with India peacefully’

At an interaction with the Indian community in Morocco on September 22 this year, Rajnath Singh stated that he was confident of India getting back Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK) without taking any aggressive steps, as the people in PoK have been demanding freedom from the occupiers. “PoK will be ours on its own. Demands have started being made in PoK, you must have heard sloganeering,” he had stated. “I was addressing the Indian Army at a programme in Kashmir Valley five years ago, I had then said that we will not need to attack and capture PoK, it is anyway ours; PoK itself will say, ‘Main bhi Bharat Hoon’. That day will come,” he stated after certain people remarked that the Central government had ‘missed the chance’ to capture PoK during Operation Sindoor on May 7.

Sindh from India,” he said. “Not just in Sindh, but throughout India, Hindus consider the Indus River sacred. Many Muslims in Sindh also believed that the water of the Indus was no less sacred than the Aab-e-Zamzam of Mecca.

This is Advani ji’s quote,” he added. “Our people of Sindh, who hold the Indus River sacred, will always be our own. No matter where they are, they will always be ours,” the Defence Minister added.

‘Nothing to say’: Kharge on Cong quagmire

Amid mounting speculations over the possible change in the party’s Karnataka leadership, Congress chief Mallikarjun Kharge on Sunday asserted that the high command will decide on the issue of change in the chief ministerial face. “I have nothing to say,” he said while addressing reporters outside his residence here. “You have been standing here continuously for three days. There is nothing to say about the developments happening here. Whatever happens, the high command will do it. It is not required to worry too much about it,” Kharge said. His remarks come amid increasing speculation about a change in the CM face in Karnataka, with the alleged “power-sharing agreement” of 2023 between Siddaramaiah and DK Shivakumar being cited in political circles. Earlier in the day, Home Minister G Parameshwaram implied that he also remains in the chief ministerial race.

Siddu vs DKS tussle gets twist with GP signals CM ambition

Home Minister G Parameshwara on Sunday hinted that he too was in the race for the Chief Minister post, should a leadership change occur in the state, and amid persistent demands for a ‘Dalit CM’.

However, seeking to downplay reports of confusion within the Congress over the issue of CM change, he said that no one from the Congress high command has commented on the matter so far, nor has it been discussed within the Congress Legislature Party (CLP).

“AICC president Mallikarjun Kharge will decide on leadership change, if there is a need, after discussing with top party leader Rahul Gandhi, he said.

“Our leader Rahul Gandhi is on a foreign tour. After he comes, if there are any developments in the party, the AICC President will discuss and decide. The AICC President is from Karnataka. No one knows as much about state politics as he does. The AICC President has been in politics for 50 years. He makes decisions. If there is any confusion in the party, Rahul Gandhi will take a decision after he comes,” Parameshwara said.

Speculation about a leadership change has gained momentum in Karnataka after

the Congress government crossed the halfway mark of its five-year term on November 20, a phase some are referring to as the ‘November Revolution’. The buzz stems from an alleged ‘power-sharing’ pact between Chief Minister Siddaramaiah and Deputy Chief Minister Shivakumar dating back to 2023.

“I’m always in the race, it’s not a big issue” Replying to a query on whether he was in the CM race, Parameshwara said, “I’m always in the race; it is not a big issue. I was the Pradesh Congress Committee president in 2013, we brought the Congress government to power (in the 2013 Assembly polls). I never claimed credit for it solely. I lost in that poll. Had I won, what would have happened, I don’t know.” “I was in the race then, naturally, as there is a convention in the Congress party where the PCC president is often given a chance (to become CM), but it is not followed in some situations....,” he said.

When asked if he would approach the high command to consider him in case of a

leadership change, he said, “Let that situation come, such a situation has not come.” On his name doing the rounds as a probable CM candidate, amid ‘fight’ for the top post between Siddaramaiah and Shivakumar, he termed it media creation.

‘No plans to meet Kharge’ Clarifying that he currently has no plans to meet Kharge, the Home Minister said all decisions in the Congress are made involving the high command. Has anyone from the high command has made any statement regarding a leadership change or cabinet reshuffle, he asked.

‘All left to the high command’ “Siddaramaiah was chosen as CM at the CLP meeting after the 2023 Assembly polls, with AICC observers present, and that no mention was made of a 2.5-year term then. If CM has to be changed in between, it is left to the high command. We cannot do it. It was done in the past, Veerappa Moily replaced S Bangarappa as chief minister,” he said, adding that he does not believe such a situation has arisen now in the state.

‘White-collar module stockpiled explosives for 2 yrs’

NEW DELHI: The probe into the Faridabad white-collar terror module linked to the Delhi blast have reportedly revealed that the network spent nearly two years procuring explosives and remote-triggering devices. According to sources, Dr Muzammil Ganaie, one of the accused, during interrogation by the National Investigation Agency (NIA) has reportedly admitted to procuring 26 quintals of NPK fertilizer from Gurugram and Nuh in Haryana and also other precursor chemicals for about Rs 3 lakh.

Kharge likens SIR implementation to Covid lockdown

BENGALURU: Reacting to the deaths of Booth Level Officers (BLOs) in several states, Congress President Mallikarjun Kharge on Sunday said the hasty implementation of the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) exercise is similar to the chaos seen during demonetisation and the COVID-19 lockdown. Citing a media report that 16 Booth Level Officers have died in just 19 days, he said that the mounting workload associated with the SIR exercise is driving BLOs and polling officers to die by suicide.

AI must translate into global good: PM Modi

JOHANNESBURG

Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Sunday called for strict restrictions on the use of artificial intelligence (AI) in deepfakes, crime, and terror activities.

Addressing the third session of the G20 Summit in Johannesburg, South Africa, he highlighted the need for a global compact on AI to prevent misuse. Making a strong pitch for critical technologies to be ‘human-centric’, instead of ‘finance-centric’, the PM said, “It should be based on core principles of human oversight, safety by design and transparency,” he said.

He further said technology applications should be ‘global’ rather than ‘national’, and based on ‘open source’ rather than ‘exclusive models’.

“This vision has been in-

tegrated into India’s technology ecosystem, and the same has resulted in significant benefits, be it in space applications, AI or digital payments, where it is a world leader,” the PM added.

PM attends IBSA Leaders’ Meet

Earlier in the day, the Prime Minister participated in the IBSA (India, Brazil, South Africa) Leaders’ Meeting with South African President Cyril Ramaphosa and Brazil’s President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva. Modi affirmed India’s commitment to deepening cooperation within the trilateral forum, which focuses on promoting South-South cooperation, pushing for reforms in global governance systems and enhancing collaboration among developing nations.

SC to hear plea against Wangchuk’s detention today

NEW DELHI

The Supreme Court is scheduled to hear a plea filed by Sonam Wangchuk’s wife, which termed the climate activist’s detention under the stringent National Security Act (NSA) as illegal and an arbitrary exercise violating his fundamental rights, on Monday.

The court had on October 29 sought response of the Centre and the Ladakh administration on the amended plea of Wangchuk’s wife Gitanjali J Angmo. As per the court’s cause list of November 24, the plea is slated to come up for hearing before a bench of Justices Aravind Kumar and N V Anjaria.

B’desh sends letter to India seeking Hasina’s extradition

DHAKA

Bangladesh’s interim government has sent an “official letter” to India seeking the extradition of deposed prime minister Sheikh Hasina after a special tribunal sentenced her to death, a senior adviser said on Sunday.

“The letter was sent the day before yesterday,” Foreign Affairs Adviser Md Touhid Hossain was quoted as saying by agencies.

As per reports, the note verbal (official diplomatic letter) was sent through the Bangladesh High Commission in New Delhi. On November 17, the International Crimes Tribunal (ICT-BD) sentenced 78-year-old Hasina to death along with then home minister Asaduz-

zaman Khan Kamal on charges of committing “crimes against humanity” after their trial in absentia. Hasina is currently in India. Kamal is believed to be hiding in India. Hasina’s Awami League government was toppled in a student-led violent protest termed as the ‘July Uprising’ on August 5 last year.

Three days later, Nobel Laureate Muhammad Yunus flew from Paris at the call of the protesting students to assume the charge of the interim government as its chief adviser. Hasina and the two others were accused of adopting brutal means to tame the protestors, while a UN rights office report said about 1,400 people were killed between July 15 and August 15 last year.

It’s a twin! Anarkali gives birth to twin calves in Panna Tiger Reserve

PANNA

In a rare biological phenomenon in the wild, Anarkali, a 57-year-old elephant, gave birth to two twin female calves at the Panna Tiger Reserve (PTR) on Sunday.

The calves were born nearly three hours apart under the close supervision of veterinarians and wildlife experts. Both the mother and her newborns are reported to be healthy.

Dr Sanjeev Kumar Gupta, wildlife veterinarian, described the birth as “a wonder of nature and a rare occurrence”, stressing that elephant twin births are extremely uncommon even in protected environments.

PTR, known for its tigers, is also home to a strong population of elephants. With the arrival of Anarkali’s twin calves, the number of elephants in the reserve has now



increased to 21.

Reserve officials said this is the first time in PTR’s history that an elephant has delivered twins. The news has sparked excitement among forest staff, researchers, and wildlife lovers alike.

PTR Field Director Naresh Singh Yadav said that special care arrangements have been put in place. “Anarkali is being given highly nutritious food, including porridge, sugarcane, jaggery, and pure ghee

laddus,” he said. A dedicated team has been deployed exclusively for the feeding and care of the newborns.

Anarkali is no ordinary elephant. According to PTR records, she was brought to the reserve in 1986 and since then has been an indispensable part of forest protection efforts.

Over the past decades, she has given birth to six calves, but this is her first experience of delivering twin female calves.

Bengaluru North City Corporation imposes meat ban

Bengaluru North City Corporation has announced a complete ban on animal slaughter and meat sales on November 25, 2025, in observance of Sadhu Vaswani Jayanti. City's second airport faces major roadblocks

The much-awaited second international airport in Bengaluru is facing delays due to multiple hurdles. Both the Bengaluru and proposed Hosur airports fall within controlled HAL airspace, creating regulatory challenges. The existing Kempegowda International Airport's 150 km concession agreement also blocks commercial operations at new airports until at least 2033. AAI reports highlight terrain issues near Kanakapura and Nelmangala, including hilly and rocky land close to Bannerghatta hills. Tamil Nadu's Hosur airport proposal faces farmer opposition, while the state aims to benefit from Bengaluru's aviation growth. Officials continue exploring solutions, but the project remains stalled.

Stray dog fear rises in Kodigehalli area

BENGALURU
Stray dog attacks have increased in Kodigehalli's Kempegowda Nagar area, creating fear among residents and walkers. Over the last two weeks, several people reported packs of dogs roaming streets and parks at night. Two weeks ago, about twenty stray dogs attacked Viresh, a thirty-three-year-old worker, near Bommasandra Lake in Ganesh Nagar. He suffered deep injuries on his hands, legs, neck and head. He was treated at Victoria Hospital and has now returned home, but still needs care. Because of the injuries, he cannot go back to work and is struggling to pay hospital bills. His family says no compensation has been given yet by local authorities. Earlier, another man named Sitappa was killed in a similar attack in the nearby Telecom Layout. After these incidents, officials caught some dogs and moved them, but residents say the same dogs returned within a week. Now the problem has grown again, and people are afraid to step outside after sunset. Children are not allowed to play alone, and morning walkers feel unsafe in parks. Locals also complain about loud barking at night, which disturbs their sleep. Residents have requested the civic body to take strict action by relocating aggressive dogs and starting proper sterilization drives. They also demanded medical and financial help for victims like Viresh, who are suffering due to the attacks. People say safety should be



B'luru West Commissioner orders Yeshwantpur junction upgrade

Bengaluru West Municipal Corporation Commissioner Dr. Rajendra K.V. has instructed officials to develop and beautify the traffic island at Yeshwantpur Junction to improve traffic flow and public safety. He conducted a surprise inspection by riding a two-wheeler from Makeri Circle to Manjunath Metro Station. During the visit, he closely observed road conditions, traffic movement, and public infrastructure. He directed officials to repaint the Yeshwantpur flyover, install proper streetlights, and beautify the surrounding areas for better visibility and safety. Rajendra expressed concern over the poor condition of medians. He noted that many medians in the middle of the road were dirty and neglected. He ordered immediate cleaning and improvement of all medians to ensure a better look and safer roads for commuters. He also instructed officers to renovate and maintain bus stops properly. He said bus stops must provide comfort and safety to passengers and should not be ignored. Broken shelters and damaged benches should be repaired quickly. The Commissioner also focused on removing black spots in the area. He ordered officials to identify all garbage dumping points along roads, footpaths and empty sites, and clear them immediately. He directed them to monitor these areas strictly to ensure no new dumping happens. During the inspection, he noticed blocked drains

For the first time, the Karnataka government will organize an international job fair in Bengaluru in January 2026. This special event is meant to help skilled workers from the State find job opportunities in foreign countries. The job fair is being planned by the Department of Skill Development, Entrepreneurship and Livelihoods. According to officials, there is a high demand for Indian workers in many countries, especially in Europe, Gulf nations, and Middle Eastern countries. Jobs are mainly available for nurses, caregivers, plumbers, carpenters, mechanics, and other technical workers. This fair will give a direct chance for trained candidates to meet foreign companies and recruitment agencies. Manoj Kumar Meena, Secretary of the department, said that the government is already contacting foreign companies and consulates. They are using emails and roadshows to reach employers abroad. He said India has a strong skilled workforce, and many countries are searching for such workers. Inspired by the Kerala model, Karnataka will also organize a nursing conference for nurses trained in the State. This will help them connect with international healthcare employers. The government tool room and training centre is also preparing students. German language laboratories will be started in two centres. German language training will be provided, especially for those going to European countries. All selected candidates will receive one year of language training before final recruitment. This training will not only focus on basic language, but also on communication needed for working with patients and elderly people. Special tests will be conducted and language certificates will be given. Officials believe this job fair will help thousands of unemployed youth who have completed skill-based courses. It will open global job doors for them and improve their financial condition. The government hopes this event will strengthen Karnataka's position as a major skill and employment hub in India.



Anekal residents to protest against poor road conditions

More than 10,000 residents of Anekal taluk will hold a massive protest on November 29 against the terrible condition of roads in their areas. The protest will take place at the ASB College Grounds under the banner of the Anekal Taluk Citizens' Welfare Committee. Residents from Muttanallur, Hebbagodi, Singena Aghahara and nearby areas are joining the protest. They are demanding immediate asphaltting of the main roads in Heelalige, Singena Aghahara, Anantha Nagar and Sampige Nagar. According to them, these roads have been in poor condition for nearly twenty years. The committee said that despite many complaints and requests made to local authorities, no permanent solution has been given. More than 20 apartment layouts in these areas still do not have proper roads, drainage facilities and regular water supply. Due to this, daily life has become very difficult for families, elderly people, patients and students. Though the problem was reported to panchayat members, the tehsildar and the local MLA, only temporary patchwork was done. But because of heavy traffic, the patched areas break down again within a few weeks. Shiva Reddy, a member of the committee, said the 3-kilometre road from Huskuru Road to Anantha Nagar and Heelalige is in very bad condition.




KEA announces recruitment for various govt posts

The Karnataka Examination Authority (KEA) has released a new recruitment notification for various government posts, including Assistant Traffic Manager. This is a good opportunity for graduates and postgraduates who want a stable government job in Karnataka. According to the notification, online applications are open and interested candidates must apply before December 10, 2025. The recruitment covers several posts in different departments under KEA. The list of vacancies includes Assistant Administrative Officer (2 posts), Assistant Accounts Officer (2 posts), Assistant Legal Officer (6 posts), Assistant Labour Welfare Officer (5 posts), Assistant Mechanical Engineer (8 posts), and Assistant Traffic Manager (10 posts). Candidates must have completed Graduation, B.Com, LL.B, BE/B.Tech, MBA, MSW or any Postgraduate degree from a recognized university or board. Different posts have different qualification requirements, so applicants must check the official notification carefully. As per the age limit rules, candidates should be between 18 and 38 years as of September 29, 2025. Age relaxation is given as per government norms. Category 2A, 2B, 3A and 3B candidates get 3 years relaxation, while SC, ST and Category-1 candidates get 5 years relaxation. The application fee is ₹750 for General and backward categories. For SC, ST and Category-1 candidates, the fee is ₹500. For Persons with Disabilities (PWD), the fee is ₹250. To apply, candidates must first read the KEA Recruitment Notification 2025 carefully. Then they should visit the official KEA website and click on the online application link. Fill all required details correctly and upload scanned copies of necessary documents and a recent photo. After paying the application fee, submit the form. Applicants are advised to apply early to avoid last-minute problems and keep a copy of the application for future reference.



B'luru Central launches phone-in program to address civic issues

The Bengaluru Central Municipal Corporation has announced a special phone-in program where citizens can directly speak to the Commissioner about their civic problems. Commissioner Rajendra Cholan will personally take calls from the public on Monday, November 24, 2025, between 6.00 pm and 7.00 pm. This program is being conducted to help residents report their problems quickly and get faster solutions without delay. Citizens living under the limits of the Bengaluru Central Municipal Corporation can call the control room hotline number 080-22975803 during the scheduled time. The Commissioner said the aim of this program is to listen directly to the people and give immediate instructions to officials for solving their issues. This weekly program will be held every Monday during the same time to connect better with residents and understand their daily problems. People can report complaints related to road potholes, damaged roads, and road repair work. They can also complain about streetlight problems, garbage collection issues, and delays in waste removal. Other issues that can be reported include cutting of dry or dangerous trees, park maintenance problems, e-account related difficulties, and removal of illegal banners and posters. Complaints about footpath repairs, footpath encroachments by vendors or shops, and drainage cleaning can also be shared during the call. Further, citizens can raise concerns about any other basic services provided by the Municipal Corporation. Rajendra Cholan said he will listen to every caller and guide the concerned department officials on the spot to start action. He assured that genuine complaints will be taken seriously and followed up. He requested citizens to use this opportunity wisely and provide clear details of their problems, including area name and location, so action can be taken quickly without confusion or delay.



Safari ban hurts livelihoods, operators demand immediate action

Travel operators in Karnataka have urged the State government to restart jungle safaris in Bandipur and Nagarhole, saying the ban has badly affected tourism and the lives of thousands of families who depend on it. Safari services in both tiger reserves were stopped earlier this month after a series of tiger attacks in H.D. Kote and Sargur areas, where three farmers lost their lives. Due to fear among villagers, the government suspended safaris and trekking so forest officials could track and capture tigers that had moved towards human settlements. The Forest Department has since captured two tigers linked to the incidents. Karnataka State Travel Owners' Association President K. Radhakrishna Holla said the tourism sector in the State is already facing many difficulties. With fewer tourists coming, the safari suspension has made things worse. He said winter is usually the busiest season for tourism. Stopping safaris during this time has caused heavy financial loss to operators, drivers, guides, and hotel staff. He explained that summer restrictions are understandable due to fire risk and water shortage, but a complete ban in winter is harming people who depend on safari-based tourism for daily income. Narayana L.R., a cab driver from Yelahanka, shared his struggle. He said he used to earn around ₹12,000 to ₹15,000 per week by taking tourists to Bandipur. After the ban, his income has fallen to just about ₹3,000. He added that many drivers and workers are now finding it hard to run their homes. The association has requested the government to follow a balanced approach instead of a total shutdown. They have asked for safaris to resume with strict safety rules, limited entry, and only certified vehicles.

Kharge's Fire Brigade Politics: Can He Douse the Siddaramaiah-DKS Blaze?

The power struggle within the Karnataka Congress has once again exposed the fault-lines of leadership and ego that have haunted the grand old party for decades.

At the centre of the latest storm stands the tussle between Chief Minister Siddaramaiah and Deputy Chief Minister D.K. Shivakumar, a conflict simmering behind smiles ever since the formation of the government. With All India Congress Committee (AICC) president Mallikarjun Kharge camping in Bengaluru and holding a marathon meeting with Siddaramaiah, the crisis has officially entered the danger zone.

Kharge's stern message is clear: the infighting cannot continue if the Congress wants to retain its only stronghold in South India. The meeting lasting over 90 minutes was not merely a discussion but a warning session. Kharge is believed to have reminded Siddaramaiah that



the party risks the same fate as it faced earlier in states where divided leadership brought governments down. What worries the national leadership is not just the fight for the chair, but the public display of factional power by followers of both camps, which could eventually turn voters against the ruling party. According to party insiders, Siddaramaiah has conveyed a

firm and unbending stance. He has reportedly declared that he will continue as CM till 2028 and only after the next Assembly election should the question of succession arise. He has warned that forcing him out prematurely would alienate the entire AHINDA bloc—his core caste and minority support base—leading to a collapse of the Congress' electoral prospects.

In a direct challenge, he has asked the high command to hold a show-of-strength test among MLAs to determine who truly commands majority support. Siddaramaiah's bold tone indicates a leader unwilling to compromise or step down under pressure. On the other side, Shivakumar's frustration has turned into silent resentment. Sources indicate that Shivakumar is deeply upset with the Delhi leaders who refused to meet him on his recent visit—an insult he has not forgotten. He sees this as a deliberate snub, especially when Siddaramaiah was given immediate access to the same leaders. Shivakumar and his camp believe his sacrifices—saving the party from desertions, raising funds, and mobilising cadres—are being ignored now that the Congress has tasted victory.

Kharge, caught between a stubborn Chief Minister and a sulking Deputy, is trying to extinguish a fire that threatens the party's future not just in Karnataka but across South India. If this fortress falls, the Congress will retain only Telangana in the region—an intolerable risk for a party trying to rebuild nationally. Kharge will carry both leaders' views to Rahul Gandhi and the high command, but the big question remains: will a quick fix work, or is the Congress sleepwalking into disaster once again?



MP Yaduveer bats for a shorter NCC course to imbibe discipline in society

MYSURU

Mysuru-Kodagu Lok Sabha Member Yaduveer Krishnadatta Chamaraja Wadiyar opined that the values, the order instilled, and the discipline instilled in the cadets is required across the board in society and it is much needed, not just as NCC cadets but as general population in India.

Speaking at the 77th Foundation Day of the National Cadet Corps in Mysuru on Sunday, he said they lack order and discipline, and the value system that is enshrined in the NCC—there is no reason why it shouldn't be extended across the board into the very depths of Indian society.

Often, people think that order, discipline, and bringing these value systems in is a limiting agenda; it doesn't allow for people to have their freedom. But as they all know, the means to freedom is to have a disciplined and orderly life. From that is what comes actual freedom—the freedom to achieve things, the freedom to see your next generation rise even above themselves, and the freedom, of course, to see the country reach its true pinnacle and its true former avatar of what Bharat was: being at the forefront, not just militarily, not just economically, but also spiritually.

The MP said that because at the end of the day, all spiritual endeavors come from an order. The idea of ritual is to bring order to life, is to bring discipline to life. The eventual role of ritual is to eventually submerge itself—the visarjan of ritual is an important part in the endeavor towards freedom—but as a building block towards that freedom, towards that society, and towards that ideal life, it's an integral part. And today the order and the discipline and the value system that is in NCC is akin to that ritual that is part of the greater Bharatiya society.

He said Bharat, as they all know, is for the complete economic development of India; but within that are very many units—if Bharat is to be achieved, they need states, if states are to be achieved, they need cities. If that is to be achieved, they need individuals. Individuals are the core underlying unit that will allow this building block eventually to build up to this great institution that will be Bharat. If the individual is not there, there is no Bharat.

Yaduveer opined that if they want to get into NCC they should be available to them and the system, but there should be some sort of shorter courses over the summer, etc. (and I'm sure they already are) where other individuals can come in and imbibe these value systems. That should be a key endeavor going forward, because they all need it and the entire society needs this as well. "I understand you have 3.2 acres which require development and a hangar. I will speak with the Colonel, and let us get and work on that CSR coming here towards ensuring that that hangar comes up to Mysuru, that tradition in Mysuru of having that air squadron here and that training that is extended their towards building up our capacity for our air force is much needed."

Auto driver's suicide attempt sparks protest in Chitradurga

A suicide attempt by auto driver Tippeswamy in Chitradurga has triggered police scrutiny, public concern, and massive protests by drivers

CHITRADURGA

In Chitradurga, Superintendent of Police Ranjith Kumar Bandaru addressed the media regarding the suicide attempt by auto driver Tippeswamy from Malappanahatti. He clarified that if any police personnel are found at fault, an inquiry led by the Additional SP will be conducted and appropriate action will follow.

According to the SP, the auto was moving in the wrong direction, prompting police to stop it. Officers suspected the driver was intoxicated based on his behavior. When they attempted to check him, he tried to flee after parking the auto, leading the police to intervene and bring him back for questioning.



Responding to queries on alleged assault, the SP stated that CCTV footage from the spot would be thoroughly examined and action will be taken if any wrongdoing is found.

Around 9:50 pm, Tippeswamy reportedly poured petrol on himself at Gandhi Circle after surrounding the

area with fire and accidentally caught flames. He was first treated at the district hospital and later shifted to SS Hospital in Davangere for advanced care. The SP confirmed that the department is assisting with his treatment and has been coordinating with Davangere police officials.

Expressing disappointment,

the SP said that bystanders could have intervened when the man was trying to set himself on fire. Even after he ignited, no one rushed to help immediately, which he termed disheartening.

Meanwhile, hundreds of auto drivers gathered at Gandhi Circle, blocking the road and staging a protest since morning. They condemned police behavior, demanded justice, and urged authorities to support Tippeswamy, who has suffered over 50% burns. They insisted that auto drivers be treated respectfully, proper parking spots be designated, and strict action be taken against those responsible. They warned of an intensified agitation if their demands are ignored.

MLA warns against middlemen creating fertilizer shortage

Farmers are facing serious difficulties this monsoon due to an artificial shortage of fertilizers, allegedly created by private dealers and middlemen selling seeds and farm inputs, said Jagalur MLA B. Devendrappa. Addressing a gathering at Hosakote village, he stressed that these brokers are exploiting farmers for profit and urgent measures are needed to safeguard them.

He was speaking after inaugurating the equipment distribution programme under the National Food and Nutritional Security Mission, along with a training session on agricultural practices for the rabi season. Devendrappa emphasized that strict monitoring is required to ensure farmers receive genuine fertilizers and seeds at the right time. Deputy Director of Agriculture Dr. Naeem Pasha, who also addressed the event, said that as modern technology advances, agricultural methods must evolve as well. Excessive use of urea has led to declining soil health and reduced crop yields, he cautioned.

YADGIR

Illegal sand extraction from the Krishna River has been increasing rapidly across the district, with serious allegations emerging that certain officials are colluding with the sand mafia. Local residents and leaders claim that the unchecked exploitation is causing massive financial losses to the government, estimated in crores.

In Surpur taluk—particularly in areas such as Sugur, Mushtahalli, and Hemmadagi—unauthorised sand mining has become rampant. Trucks are said to be transporting sand openly, even in broad daylight, without fear of action. Locals allege that some government officials are directly supporting the illegal operators, while others who



are supposed to curb the activity have remained silent, turning a blind eye to the ongoing violations.

Despite repeatedly bringing the issue to the attention of concerned authorities, no concrete action has been taken so far. Residents state that illegal sand transportation continues every day, worsening the ecological damage to the river and surrounding regions.

Frustrated by the lack of response, local leaders have issued a warning. They have demanded that the responsible departments immediately clamp down on the sand mafia and end the unlawful operations. If the authorities continue to ignore the issue, they say they will be forced to launch a public protest to safeguard the river and prevent further exploitation.

Jarkiholi opposes crediting few leaders for Cong Party's win

BELAGAVI

Public Works Minister Satish Jarkiholi openly voiced his disagreement with the notion that Congress came to power in Karnataka solely because of a few leaders. Without naming Deputy Chief Minister D.K. Shivakumar, he delivered a sharp indirect counter, stating that such claims are unacceptable.

Speaking to the media in Belagavi, Jarkiholi said that Congress's victory was the result of the support of 1.25 crore voters. "We became MLAs and ministers because of the people. One should maintain limits. Claiming that everything happened because of one person is completely wrong," he said. He added that many people worked both directly and indirectly to bring Congress to power. Drawing a comparison, he said that when Tenzing Norgay climbed Mt. Everest in 1960, global newspapers highlighted only his name, ignoring the 14 others who climbed with him. "This situation is similar," he remarked.

He stressed that every leader, including first-time MLAs, worked tirelessly, and everyone deserves equal recognition. While leaders naturally stake their claims, he said,

credit cannot be monopolised by a handful. He also pointed out that former KPCC president Dr. G. Parameshwara led the party for seven years and contributed significantly.

Commenting on Parameshwara expressing interest in the Chief Minister's post, Jarkiholi said there was nothing wrong in that. "We too are aspirants. SC, ST and minority communities are key voters for Congress, and they must be represented," he added.

Responding to questions on the alleged 2.5-year power-sharing formula, he said discussions, if any, happened in Delhi, not Bengaluru. He expressed confidence that the High Command would soon settle the leadership issues, as AICC president Mallikarjun Kharge had already held meetings.

When asked about his own CM aspirations, Jarkiholi declined to comment.

HUSBAND KILLS WIFE

Kolar woman strangled to death by husband over suspicion

KOLAR

In Kolar's Jannaghatta village, a woman was allegedly murdered by her husband after he repeatedly suspected her frequent visits to her parental home. The victim, Kavaya, had reportedly faced constant harassment from her husband Shivraj, who eventually strangled her to death. Following a complaint from her parents, the

police arrested the accused.

According to investigators, Shivraj, who worked as an auto driver, often quarreled with his wife, suspecting her loyalty. On November 21, an argument escalated into a violent fight where both exchanged blows. Enraged, Shivraj allegedly pushed Kavaya to the ground, sat on her chest, and

strangled her. After committing the crime around midnight, he roamed outside until evening, later pretending to discover his wife unconscious. Neighbours helped take her to the hospital, but doctors confirmed she had been dead for several hours, raising suspicion.

Kavaya's parents lodged a

complaint, leading to Shivraj's arrest. During interrogation, he admitted to killing his wife. Police revealed that the couple had been married for eight years and had a seven-year-old daughter. Over time, disagreements grew, with Shivraj suspecting Kavaya's visits to her parental home and allegedly humiliating her for not bearing a male child. He also pressured her

to bring money from her family and was known to assault her during disputes.

Despite several attempts at reconciliation through family interventions, Shivraj's mistrust persisted. On the day of the incident, after sending their daughter to school, another argument erupted, turning violent. Shivraj then strangled Kavaya, a fact confirmed during the investigation.

Eyewitnesses described a loud crash as the speeding vehicle lost control and slammed into the stationary truck.

Six killed in two road accidents in Andhra Pradesh

Six people were killed and 16 others injured in two separate road accidents in Andhra Pradesh on Sunday. Four people were killed and six others injured when a Multi-Utility Vehicle (MUV) rammed into a stationary truck in Andhra Pradesh's Srikakulam district in the wee hours of Sunday. The accident occurred on the national highway near Yetturallapadu village in Kotabommali mandal. According to police, the vehicle carrying pilgrims from Madhya Pradesh rammed into the stationary truck from behind. Police and the patrolling staff of the highway rushed to the spot and launched rescue and relief operations. The pilgrims were heading to the Srisailem temple for darshan.

Gandhidham Set for ₹176-Crore Urban Upgrade

AHMEDABAD

Gandhidham, recently upgraded from a municipality to a municipal corporation, is poised for a major urban transformation as Chief Minister Bhupendra Patel unveiled development works worth Rs 176 crore during his first visit to the city after its new civic status was announced.

The projects, which include a model fire station, smart library, iconic entry gate, upgraded gardens, roads, water and drainage networks, and stormwater systems, aim to give the industrial hub a new identity and redefine its urban landscape.

The city's most symbolic project will be the redevelopment of the stretch from Gopalpuri Gate to Sarvodaya

Punjab Protests Centre's Chandigarh Autonomy Shift

Punjab's political parties unite in strong opposition after Centre proposes bringing Chandigarh under Article 240 through constitutional amendment

CHANDIGARH

A major political controversy has gripped Punjab following the Centre's move to bring Chandigarh under the purview of Article 240 of the Constitution, a provision that empowers the President to directly frame regulations for certain Union Territories. The proposal, hinted through a Parliament bulletin announcing the likely introduction of the Constitution (131st Amendment) Bill, 2025 during the Winter Session starting December 1, has triggered vehement protests across the state's political spectrum.

Currently, Chandigarh is



administered by the Governor of Punjab and functions as the shared capital of Punjab and Haryana. The city was designated a Union Territory in 1966 when Haryana was carved out of Punjab. Ever since, Punjab's political leadership has consistently asserted that Chandigarh rightfully

belongs to the state, arguing that Haryana should establish its own capital.

The Centre's plan to place Chandigarh under Article 240 — a provision that presently applies to Andaman and Nicobar Islands, Puducherry, Lakshadweep, Dadra and Nagar Haveli, and Daman and Diu — has been criticised by parties including the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP), Congress and the Shiromani Akali Dal (SAD). Leaders from these parties have termed the proposal anti-Punjab and a direct challenge to the state's historical claim over Chandigarh.

Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann strongly condemned the move, alleging that the

BJP-led central government was conspiring to snatch Punjab's capital. Reiterating Punjab's emotional and historical attachment to the city, he declared, Chandigarh was, is and will always remain an integral part of the state. Mann added that Punjab had sacrificed several villages to build Chandigarh and therefore held the rightful ownership.

AAP national convenor and former Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal also criticised the Centre's intentions, calling the step an assault on Punjab's identity and accusing the government of attempting to undermine federal principles.

A second-grade teacher at Raipur School (7 LNP), she managed Part No. 160 of the Ganganagar Assembly constituency while caring for her seven-month-old daughter and five-year-old son. With the support of her husband, Hoshiyaar Singh, she resumed field duties with full determination despite her dual workload. She successfully distributed counting forms to 983 voters and completed digitisation for 806 forms within the prescribed timeline.

AIADMK's key meetings in Chennai on Dec 10

CHENNAI

AIADMK has announced that its General Council and Executive Committee meetings will be held on December 10 at Vanagaram in Chennai. Party general secretary Edappadi K. Palaniswami (EPS) confirmed that both crucial meetings will take place at the Sri Varu Venkatachalapathy Hall, marking an important moment for the organisation as Tamil Nadu heads towards the 2026 Assembly election.

According to the announcement, AIADMK Presidium Chairman Tamilmagan Husain will preside over the General Council session.

Invitations will be sent to all members of the General Council and Executive Committee,

and the communication emphasises that attendance is mandatory for every member.

The timing of the meetings has gained significance as they come ahead of the Assembly election scheduled for next year.

Party sources expect major discussions on the AIADMK's election strategy, alliance formation, and broader political positioning.

EPS, who has been consolidating control over the party, is likely to outline the roadmap for the campaign and initiate preparations for booth-level and district-level organisational strengthening.

The meetings are also expected to be politically charged, given the recent internal turmoil. Veteran leader C.

Ve. Shanmugam (Sengottaiyan), once considered one of the senior-most leaders close to the EPS camp, recently rebelled against the leadership.

He demanded that expelled leaders O. Panneerselvam (OPS), T.T.V. Dhinakaran, and V.K. Sasikala be brought back into the party fold.

Sengottaiyan publicly issued a deadline for the leadership to take action, triggering a sharp response from OPS.

Following his open defiance, Sengottaiyan was stripped of his organisational responsibilities. He subsequently appeared alongside OPS, Dhinakaran and Sasikala in public meetings and interviews, signalling a possible realignment among the expelled factions.



18,000 Srimushnam Farmers Added to Cauvery Zone

CHENNAI

In a major boost to agricultural development, more than 18,000 farmers across 38 revenue panchayats in the newly formed Srimushnam taluk of Cuddalore district have been brought under the ambit of the Cauvery delta protected agricultural zone. The move follows a government order issued by the Water Resources Department, giving effect to Chief Minister M. K. Stalin's announcement made during a public event in Cuddalore on July 15.

With this inclusion, farmers in Srimushnam will now receive all benefits available to cultivators in the core delta districts, including Kuruvai and Samba cultivation packages and irrigation-related schemes. The decision significantly widens the protected zone and ensures that farmers in these panchayats gain access to vital support such as subsidies, assured water allocations, and technical assistance that are crucial for sustaining paddy cycles.

Senior officials said the order brings 10,550 hectares of land under the protected zone, marking a key policy move aimed at strengthening agricultural resilience. Many of the 18,250 beneficiaries rely entirely on canal irrigation and seasonal river flows,

making their livelihoods highly dependent on water availability during the crucial cultivation months.

A senior Agriculture Department official noted that the decision would directly stabilise farming operations and boost productivity in regions whose soil characteristics and irrigation needs mirror those of the delta.

Water Resources Department Secretary J. Jayakanthan, in the order, explained that the inclusion followed extensive consultations with domain experts, Cauvery technical cell engineers, and the district administration. Their detailed assessment confirmed that the soil profile, water resources, and agricultural patterns of these panchayats were consistent with those of the larger Cauvery delta, providing a strong rationale for their formal recognition.

The move is expected to improve water security, reduce climate vulnerability, and enhance long-term agricultural sustainability in Srimushnam.

₹100-cr drug haul in 4 NE states in a week; 12 held

Various law enforcement agencies, including the Assam Rifles and the BSF, have intensified their crackdown on narcotics smuggling, seizing drugs worth around Rs 100 crore and arresting 12 peddlers, including four Myanmar nationals, over the past week, officials said on Sunday.

An official said that Assam Rifles, Border Security Force (BSF), Directorate of Revenue Intelligence (DRI), Excise and Narcotics Department of Mizoram, Tripura,

Manipur and Mizoram police either jointly or individual operation have seized the drugs including highly addictive methamphetamine tablets, heroin, cocaine, dry Ganja (marijuana), foreign-origin cigarettes from Mizoram, Tripura, Manipur and Assam.

Nexus among the drug peddlers of Mizoram, Tripura, Assam and Myanmar are conducting the illegal trade of narcotics, whose main hub is Myanmar's Chin state. On November 17, dismantling an international drug syndicate involving Pakistan, in a breakthrough against narcotics trafficking, the Assam Rifles, in a joint operation with the Customs Department, seized 800 gm of cocaine valued at nearly Rs 8 crore and arrested two drug peddlers in Tripura.

A Customs Department official had said that, acting on specific intelligence inputs about a drug-trafficking syndicate smuggling high-purity cocaine into India through the Punjab border from Pakistan, the Agartala Customs Department has busted a major narcotics network operating across multiple states.

IAF PILOT CREMATION

Wing Cdr Syal Cremated with Full Military Honours

The mortal remains of Indian Air Force (IAF) pilot Wing Commander Namansh Syal, who lost his life in a Tejas fighter jet crash at the Dubai Air Show, were brought to his native Patiyalkar village in Himachal Pradesh on Sunday and cremated with full military honours. The 34-year-old fighter pilot hailed from Yol near Nagrota Bagwan in Kangra district and was known for his exemplary service record.

Wing Commander Syal was posted at the Hyderabad airbase and is survived by his wife, Afsaan, an IAF officer, and their five-year-old daughter.



His parents, Jagan Nath, a former serviceman and later a principal in the Himachal Pradesh Education Department, and his mother Bina

Devi, were in Hyderabad to meet him when tragedy struck on November 21. The HAL-designed Tejas Light Combat Aircraft he was flying

during a low-altitude display at Dubai's Al Maktoum International Airport reportedly lost control, crashed, and caught fire.

In a tribute shared on X, the Southern Air Command Media Co-ordination Centre said, Honouring Wg Cdr Namansh Syal, who made the ultimate sacrifice during the Dubai Air Show on 21 Nov 2025. His courage, skill, and dedication to the nation will forever inspire us. Gone too soon, but never forgotten.

The IAF, in a statement, described him as a dedicated fighter pilot and thorough professional whose unwavering commitment and dignified demeanour earned deep admi-

ration. Officials noted that UAE authorities, IAF colleagues, friends, and officials from the Indian Embassy attended his solemn send-off.

The IAF stands in solidarity with his family in this hour of profound grief and honours his legacy of courage, devotion and honour, the statement added.

Navy to Commission Mahe-Class
Anti-Submarine Vessel Today

Indian Navy commissions Mahe today in Mumbai, marking arrival of advanced indigenous shallow-water combatants strengthening maritime defence capabilities

MUMBAI

The Indian Navy will commission Mahe, the first vessel of the Mahe-class Anti-Submarine Warfare Shallow Water Craft, at the Naval Dockyard in Mumbai today, an official said. The ceremony, hosted by Vice-Admiral Krishna Swaminathan, Flag Officer Commanding-in-Chief, Western Naval Command, will be presided over by Chief of the Army Staff General Upendra Dwivedi. The commissioning of Mahe marks the induction of a new generation of indigenous shallow-water combatants — sleek, swift and resolutely Indian.

With more than 80 per cent indigenous content, the Mahe-class reflects India's grow-



ing expertise in warship design, construction and systems integration. Designed as a "Silent Hunter" for the Western Seaboard, Mahe underscores the Navy's commitment to self-reliance while reinforcing its anti-submarine warfare capability in coastal and shallow waters.

Built by Cochin Shipyard Limited (CSL), Kochi, Mahe represents a significant milestone in the 'Aatmanirbhar

Bharat' initiative in naval shipbuilding. Compact yet powerful, the craft embodies agility, precision and endurance — all essential qualities for dominance in littoral zones. With its blend of firepower, stealth and high manoeuvrability, the ship is equipped to track submarines, conduct coastal patrols and secure India's critical maritime approaches.

Named after the historic

coastal town of Mahe on the Malabar Coast, the vessel carries a crest featuring an Urumi — the flexible Kalari-payattu sword symbolising agility, precision and lethal grace. The crest, unveiled last week, celebrates Mahe's cultural and martial legacy, depicting the Urumi rising from the sea.

Meanwhile, the Indian Navy has begun preparations for Navy Day 2025, to be celebrated on December 3. A major operational demonstration is planned at Shangumugham beach in Thiruvananthapuram, showcasing precision, professionalism and the Navy's expanding maritime strength. The celebration, originally set for December 4, has been advanced by a day.

Outgoing CJI B.R. Gavai highlights social media's impact on judiciary and plans social work after completing distinguished judicial tenure

CJI B.R. Gavai Reflects on Social
Media Challenges, Vows Social Service

NEW DELHI

On the eve of passing the baton to his successor, Chief Justice of India B.R. Gavai on Sunday reflected on the growing challenges posed by social media, noting that its influence has affected the judiciary as much as other arms of the state. Interacting with reporters before dismissing office, CJI Gavai, 64, said, "Social media has become a problem these days, attributing statements to people that they never made, affecting not only the judiciary but all branches of government."

Justice Gavai, the first Buddhist to serve as the head of the Indian judiciary, made it clear he would not take up any official post after retirement. Instead, he hinted at dedicating his time to social work. He said he would take 10 days of rest before decid-

ing his next steps and expressed his intention to contribute in tribal regions, adding that social work is "in our blood."

During his long and respected judicial career, CJI Gavai delivered several landmark rulings. His key judgments include clarifications on the constitutional role of Governors and the President regarding pending legislation and defining the limits of executive delay. He also issued significant decisions such as staying contentious provisions of the Waqf (Amendment) Act, criticising "bulldozer justice," and upholding demonetisation. Notably, he strongly advocated applying the "creamy layer" principle to Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes for affirmative action benefits.



Addressing recent controversy, he clarified that his decision on the President's reference did not overturn an earlier two-judge ruling but provided guidance for future cases.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi earlier praised CJI Gavai for displaying exemplary calm during an object-throwing incident in the Supreme Court in October, calling the attack "utterly condemnable" and appreciating the CJI's composure.

Justice Gavai, son of former Bihar Governor R.S. Gavai, had expressed pride at becoming the country's first Buddhist Chief Justice. Emphasising inclusivity, he said, "I believe in all religions — I go to temples, dargahs, Jain temples, gurdwaras everywhere."

Speaking at the ninth Convocation of the Academy of Scientific and Innovative Research (AcSIR), the Minister said that the institution's pioneering "i-PhD" programme, introduced in 2023, represents a transformative shift in India's research training ecosystem.

Explaining the vision behind the initiative, Singh said the 'i' in i-PhD stands not only for 'industry', but also for 'imagination' and 'innovation'. Constitution (131st
Amendment) direct 'assault'
on Punjab's rights: AAP

CHANDIGARH

Punjab Finance Minister and senior Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) leader Harpal Singh Cheema on Sunday criticised the Union government for the alleged attempt to "snatch the rights of Punjab".

However, the Centre clarified it has no plan to bring the draft law in the upcoming winter session of the Parliament. Cheema told the media that only Punjab "possesses the rightful claim to Chandigarh, a city built by displacing 24 villages of the state".

He warned that any move to "snatch" Chandigarh would be met with a two-pronged resistance - a legal struggle by the state government led by Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann, and a resolute struggle by the Aam Aadmi Party alongside the three crore people of Punjab, extending from the road to the Parliament.

The Finance Minister lambasted the BJP for "embodying a spirit of Hitler" and being determined to "dismantle" the country's democratic and federal structure.

He said that "Conspiracy is being hatched even as the Punjab government and the people

of the country celebrate the 350th anniversary of the martyrdom of Guru Tegh Bahadur for religious freedom and national unity."

He cited a pattern of "anti-Punjab actions", starting with the three black farm laws intended to destroy the agricultural economy, followed by attempts to "compromise" Punjab's interests through the Bhakra Beas Management Board (BBMB), the "unpleasant bid" to seize senate of Panjab University in Chandigarh which could directly affected the working of about 200 colleges, and now the "deceitful maneuver" to snatch Chandigarh. Condemning the Central government for "treading the path of the Mughals to suppress Punjab's interests", Finance Minister Cheema specifically highlighted the plan to introduce the Constitution (131st Amendment) Bill.

"This proposed bill aims to bring Chandigarh under the purview of Article 240 of the Constitution, which would empower the President to make regulations for the Union Territory and legislate directly, an act the Finance Minister termed a direct assault on Punjab's rights".

Former Brazilian President Jair Bolsonaro was taken into preventive custody by police in Brasilia under an order issued by the Federal Supreme Court. According to initial information provided by the Federal Police, the arrest is not the result of a sentence, but a precautionary measure requested by investigators. Bolsonaro was detained at around 6:00 a.m. local time (0900 GMT) and immediately taken to the Federal Police headquarters in the capital. The detention comes in the final phase of an investigation into an alleged coup plot in the country. Bolsonaro, who was in power from 2019 to 2022.

Number of Koreans aboard 1945 sunken Japanese ship

Seoul

The number of Koreans aboard a Japanese ship that sank in 1945, killing up to over 3,000 people, will likely be revealed by the year-end following an analysis of passenger lists, the interior ministry said on Sunday. The government has commissioned the Foundation for Victims of Forced Mobilisation by Imperial Japan to carry out an in-depth analysis of 75 passenger lists and related items received from the Japanese foreign ministry between September last year and March this year. The analysis is expected to be completed by mid-December after the interior ministry sorts through passengers listed more than once and corrects.

South Korea to Host 2028 G20 Summit, President Lee Vows Strong Leadership in Global Cooperation

South Korean President Lee Jae Myung on Sunday announced that the country will host the Group of 20 (G20) summit in 2028, declaring that Seoul will approach its presidency with a profound sense of responsibility to strengthen the forum's role in global economic cooperation. His commitment came during the third session of the ongoing G20 Summit in Johannesburg, South Africa, where South Korea was formally confirmed as the host nation following the United States in

2026 and Britain in 2027.

Lee emphasised that hosting the G20 summit would be another significant multilateral milestone achieved during his five-year tenure, which concludes in 2030. This follows South Korea's chairmanship of the UN Security Council and the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) Summit earlier this year. He asserted that South Korea would work to ensure that the G20 continues to function as the leading platform for addressing pressing global economic challenges.

Speaking during a session

themed A Fair and Just Future for All, Lee highlighted the importance of creating a resilient and mutually beneficial supply chain for critical minerals. With ongoing tensions between the United States and China over rare earth elements causing global uncertainty, he stressed the urgency of sharing benefits between mineral-rich countries and import-dependent nations. He welcomed the G20's adoption of the Critical Minerals Framework and pointed to Seoul's leadership in the Minerals Security Partnership and the newly launched Ko-

rea-Africa Critical Minerals Cooperation Initiative.

On the subject of artificial intelligence (AI), Lee called for equitable access to AI technologies and global frameworks that ensure fairness. He noted that South Korea, as this year's APEC chair, successfully led efforts to introduce a new AI initiative aimed at supporting inclusive technological development. He also highlighted programs designed to enhance digital skills among women and youth in Africa, reaffirming Seoul's commitment to global capacity building.



Goyal Meets Israeli PM, Announces Progress on India-Israel Trade Ties

JERUSALEM

Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal on Sunday met Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu at the end of his three-day official visit, marking a significant step forward in India-Israel economic and strategic cooperation. In a post on X, Goyal said he was honoured to call on the Israeli leader and conveyed Prime Minister Narendra Modi's warm wishes during their meeting.

Goyal briefed Netanyahu on several key outcomes of his visit, including discussions with Israel's Economy Minister Nir Barkat, and the successful conclusion of the India-Israel Business Forum and CEOs Forum. More than 60 Indian business leaders participated in these engagements, reflecting strong private-sector interest in deepening bilateral collaboration.

A major highlight of the visit was the signing of the Terms of Reference to formally launch Free Trade Agreement (FTA) negotiations. Goyal noted that the proposed FTA, which is planned to be implemented in two phases, is

expected to substantially boost trade, investment and technology cooperation between the two countries. He added that such an agreement would provide new momentum to innovation, research and development, benefiting both economies.

dia's vast talent and scale. He discussed with Netanyahu ways to further expand cooperation in sectors such as agriculture, water management, defence, science and technology, and innovation. According to Goyal, the Israeli Prime Minister provided valuable guidance on shaping the next phase of bilateral engagement. Reflecting on his visit, Goyal said this was the first trip by an Indian Commerce Minister to Israel in two decades and described it as very successful. He expressed confidence that the renewed push toward an FTA and expanding innovation partnerships will significantly elevate India-Israel relations in the coming years.

UN climate chief Simon Stiell says COP30 proved global climate cooperation remains strong despite geopolitical tensions and political challenges

Global Climate Cooperation 'Alive and Kicking': UN Climate Chief Simon Stiell

UN Climate Change Executive Secretary Simon Stiell has said that global climate cooperation continues to remain active, united and resilient despite a politically turbulent year.

In a statement released following the conclusion of the 30th UN Climate Change Conference (COP30), Stiell acknowledged the difficult international climate in which the conference was held but emphasised that governments had demonstrated their determination to act collectively.

We knew this COP would take place in stormy political waters. Denial, division and geopolitics have dealt international cooperation heavy blows this year, Stiell said.

Even so, COP30 showed that climate cooperation is alive and kicking, keeping humanity in the fight for a livable planet, with the firm



determination to keep 1.5 degrees Celsius within reach.

He underlined that while the world is not yet winning the climate battle, we are undeniably still in it, and we are fighting back, citing the united stance of 194 participating countries.

Stiell highlighted that the conference sent a clear message that the global shift toward low-emissions development and climate resilience is irreversible.

He pointed to key achievements at COP30, including agreements on ensuring a just transition, commitments

to triple adaptation finance, and enhanced support for nations most vulnerable to climate disasters.

According to Stiell, these measures will help guarantee that all nations can benefit from a fast-growing clean economy.

He also praised progress under the COP30 Action Agenda, which included major pledges to expand clean energy grids, restore forests and oceans, and boost resilience for hundreds of millions worldwide.

He said these outcomes represent real-world progress on the things billions of people care about most.

As COP30 concluded in Belem, Brazil, with the approval of its final document — Global Mutirao: Uniting humanity in a global mobilisation against climate change — Stiell urged countries to accelerate the implementation of their national climate plans and maintain momentum.

INS Savitri arrives in Seychelles to boost maritime cooperation

Indian Naval Ship (INS) Savitri, an Offshore Patrol Vessel deployed in the Indian Ocean Region, reached Port Victoria in Seychelles as part of its ongoing operational mission, the Indian Navy said on Sunday.

The vessel received a warm reception from the Seychelles Coast Guard, reflecting the enduring mutual respect and strong bilateral ties between the two countries.

According to the Navy, the ship handed over essential spares to the Seychelles

Coast Guard, reaffirming India's unwavering commitment in enhancing the operational readiness and capabilities of its maritime partners, to ensure stability and security in the shared maritime domain.

During its port stay, INS Savitri conducted multiple harbour engagements, including professional exchanges, subject matter expert interactions and sharing of best practices with Seychelles Coast Guard personnel.

The ship was also opened to visitors, offering a glimpse into its operational capabili-

ties and the maritime heritage of the Indian Navy.

INS Savitri, with Seychelles Coast Guard personnel, will now undertake joint surveillance of the Exclusive Economic Zone, an exercise aimed at strengthening maritime security and enhancing situational awareness across the island nation's maritime areas.

The deployment, the Navy said, aligns with India's vision of 'Mutual and Holistic Advancement for Security and Growth Across Regions' (MAHASAGAR) and reinforces India's role as a Preferred Security Partner and

First Responder in the Indian Ocean Region.

Earlier on November 10, INS Savitri arrived at Port Beira, Mozambique, and received a warm and ceremonial welcome from personnel of the Mozambique Navy, reflecting the deep historical ties and the strong maritime cooperation between the two nations.

Later, INS Savitri also engaged in a joint training session with personnel from the Mozambique Navy at Port Beira in the Southern African country, boosting interoperability for future combined operations.



Australia pledges swift support after Cyclone Fina hits Darwin

CANBERRA

The Australian government said on Sunday that it is ready to support the Northern Territory (NT) after Tropical Cyclone Fina hit the city of Darwin. Kristy McBain, Australia's minister for emergency management, told on Sunday that the federal government was working with the NT government to provide support, including any requests for funding from the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements.

The Bureau of Meteorology (BOM) on Sunday morning downgraded its warning for Darwin, the Tiwi Islands and surrounding areas as the cyclone moved southwest over the southern Tirol Sea.

The cyclone caused damage to buildings and power outages across the city, but as of Sunday morning, there had been no reported injuries, local media said.

The bureau said that Fina is forecast to remain a severe tropical cyclone on

Sunday as it moves southwest through the southern Timor Sea. It will start weakening on Monday as it nears the northern coast of Western Australia.

The BOM said on Friday that the cyclone, currently a category 1 cyclone, is moving slowly south-southwest and is expected to strengthen to a category 2 system whilst tracking southwest during the day.

It said the storm is approaching the Cobourg Peninsula, the northernmost point of the mainland NT, about 200 km northeast of Darwin, and the Tiwi Islands and will move over the area on Friday night, before continuing southwest through the Van Diemen Gulf.

Fina is forecast to further intensify to a severe tropical cyclone on Sunday afternoon in the southern Timor Sea. There continues to remain a chance that it could reach category 3 intensity earlier, during late Friday, as it moves into the Van Diemen Gulf, the bureau added.

LAWYERS DEFY AMENDMENT

Lawyers Defy HC as Protests Intensify over 27th Amendment

ISLAMABAD

Protests against Pakistan's 27th Constitutional Amendment escalated on Sunday as large groups of lawyers in Karachi entered the premises of the Sindh High Court (SHC), openly defying directives issued by the court's registrar. According to local media reports, including Pakistan's leading daily Dawn, the SHC had prohibited the use of its premises for demonstrations, but protesting lawyers proceeded to hold a rally in an open space inside the court complex. Addressing the gathering, senior lawyers condemned the amendment's implementation and vowed to continue their agitation for judicial independence and the rule of law. They argued that the amendment, particularly the establishment of the Federal Constitutional Court



(FCC), weakened the authority of the Supreme Court and disrupted Pakistan's constitutional framework. Many carried placards and banners voicing their demands while chanting slogans against the government and the new provisions. The situation turned tense when lawyers scuffled with police officers stationed at the SHC's main entrance. Despite the confrontation, police eventually allowed the lawyers to continue their demonstration inside the premises. Additional legal professionals later joined the

protest outside the court, amplifying the day's turnout. In a related development, the Human Rights Council (HRC) of Pakistan strongly condemned what it described as the illegal arrest and five-hour detention of rights activist Farwa Askar and journalist Alifia Sohail. The organization said the two were detained on Friday outside the Karachi Press Club during a peaceful protest against the same constitutional amendment. It labelled the incident a serious breach of freedom of expression and human rights protections.

Most India GCCs boost Agentic AI, innovation teams

New Delhi

India-based global capability centres (GCCs) have moved from AI experimentation to enterprise-scale adoption, with 58 per cent of centres currently investing in Agentic AI and another 29 per cent planning to scale over the next year, a report said on Sunday. About 83 per cent of GCCs are already investing in GenAI, where pilots have increased from 37 per cent last year to 43 per cent as of 2025. According to the EY India's report, GCCs are applying GenAI where it matters most -- enhancing customer service (65 per cent), followed by finance (53 per cent), operations (49 per cent), IT and cybersecurity (45 per cent).

New Labour Code on Wages Aims to Safeguard Workers

New Delhi

The new Code on Wages that has now come into effect, promotes fairness, equity, and inclusivity in India's labour market. By ensuring uniform wage standards and social security, it safeguards both workers' rights and employers' interests. Overall, it strengthens economic justice, encourages formalisation, and enhances the dignity of labour, according to an official statement issued on Sunday. Section 5 of the Code on Wages, 2019 establishes a statutory right to minimum wages for all employees, extending its coverage to every sector, both organised and unorganised. Earlier, the minimum wages applied only to scheduled employment, covering roughly 30 per cent of the workforce.

India strengthens textile, sericulture ties with Georgia

Tbilisi

To strengthen cooperation in sericulture research, textiles, and apparel trade, a high-level delegation from the Ministry of Textiles concluded a successful multi-sectoral engagement in Georgia from November 17 to 21, the ministry said in an official statement on Sunday. The delegation, which was led by P. Sivakumar, Member Secretary, Central Silk Board (CSB) and Secretary General, International Sericultural Commission (ISC), participated in the 11th BACSA International Conference – CULTUSERI 2025, where Sivakumar delivered the Opening Address representing ISC, highlighting India's leadership in traditional silk knowledge and its relevance to creative and cultural industries.

PM Modi Proposes IBSA Fund for Climate-Resilient Agriculture

Prime Minister Modi urged deeper IBSA cooperation, proposing new initiatives on agriculture, technology, governance reforms and human-centric development.

JOHANNESBURG

Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Sunday proposed the creation of an IBSA (India, Brazil, South Africa) Fund for Climate Resilient Agriculture, aimed at bolstering South-South cooperation and supporting sustainable farming practices. Speaking at the IBSA leaders' meeting, hosted by South African President Cyril Ramaphosa and attended by Brazilian President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva, Modi commended the IBSA Fund's existing work across 40 countries in sectors such as education, health, women's empowerment and solar energy. Calling the meeting timely,



Modi noted its alignment with the first G20 Summit held on African soil and the completion of four consecutive G20 presidencies by Global South nations — three of which were led by IBSA members. This sequence, he said, had ushered in important initiatives centred on human-cen-

tric development, multilateral reforms and sustainable growth. The Prime Minister underlined that IBSA is not merely a grouping of three nations but a powerful platform connecting three continents, three robust democracies and three major economies. He stated that the member countries can complement one another's development journeys and serve as a global example of sustainable, inclusive progress. Modi highlighted several potential areas of collaboration, including millets promotion, natural farming, disaster resilience, green energy, traditional medicine and health security. Stressing the trans-

formative power of technology, he said IBSA could play a key role in shaping safe, reliable and human-centric global AI norms. He invited leaders to the AI Impact Summit to be held in India next year. Calling for urgent reform of global governance institutions, especially the UN Security Council, Modi argued that existing structures no longer reflect contemporary geopolitical and developmental realities. As part of enhancing cooperation, he proposed establishing an IBSA Digital Innovation Alliance to facilitate the sharing of Digital Public Infrastructure such as UPI, health platforms like CoWIN.

Artisan Jhabar Mal, a regular participant, presents traditional lacquer bangles that continue to draw enthusiastic visitors.

FinMin reviews revival of mega PSU insurance merger, privatisation

MUMBAI

The Finance Ministry is re-evaluating an earlier proposal to merge three public sector general insurance companies — Oriental Insurance, National Insurance, and Unit-ary India Insurance — into a single entity, sources said. The move, aimed at improving operational efficiency and scale, is under preliminary assessment following a turnaround in the firms' financial performance. Between 2019-20 and 2021-22, the government infused ₹17,450 crore into the three insurers to stabilise their finances. The initial plan to merge them was announced in the 2018-19 Budget by then Finance Min-



ister Arun Jaitley but was shelved in July 2020 in favour of a ₹12,450 crore capital infusion. With their financial position showing signs of recovery, the merger is back under consideration. In parallel, the proposal to privatise a general insurance company, as part of the government's broader divestment agenda, is also be-

ing reviewed. While options are being discussed, no decision has been finalised, sources added. The General Insurance Business (Nationalisation) Amendment Act, passed in August 2021, paved the way for privatisation by removing the requirement for the Centre to hold at least 51% in such entities. It also aims to allow greater private participation and deepen insurance penetration. Additionally, the government is expected to introduce a bill in the upcoming Winter Session of Parliament to raise the FDI cap in the insurance sector from 74% to 100%. The session begins December 1 and will run for 15 working days.

Industrial Relations Code 2020 Expands Worker Protections, Simplifies Labour Laws

NEW DELHI

The Industrial Relations Code, 2020 significantly enhances India's labour framework by expanding worker protections, simplifying compliance, and strengthening mechanisms for dispute resolution and collective bargaining, an official statement said on Sunday. Designed to bring greater clarity and uniformity to labour regulations, the Code seeks to create a balanced environment that supports both workforce security and business efficiency. A key reform introduced under the Code is the expansion of the definition of worker to include sales promotion employees, working journalists, and supervisory staff earning up to ₹18,000 per month. This move ensures that a larger segment of India's workforce gains access to statutory labour rights and social security benefits. The National Commission on Labour had long recommended the rationalisation and simplification of existing labour laws, and the consolidation of three major legislations — the Industrial Disputes Act (1947), the Trade Unions Act (1926), and the Industrial Employment (Standing Orders) Act (1946) — into a single, streamlined code marks a major step forward. According to the statement, the Industrial Relations Code aims to promote industrial peace by balancing the need

for strong worker safeguards with the operational flexibility required by businesses. It simplifies compliance by introducing uniform definitions, reducing ambiguity across the board, and improving the ease of doing business. The Code also undertakes a major overhaul of regulatory requirements. It reduces the number of rules from 105 to 51, forms from 37 to 18, and completely eliminates the requirement of maintaining physical registers. These reductions are expected to significantly lower compliance burdens and encourage employment generation. Workers also stand to gain from expanded access to benefits such as healthcare and sick leave. Additionally, the Code broadens the definition of industry to include any systematic activity carried out through cooperation between employers and workers, regardless of capital investment or profit motive. This expansion brings a wide range of non-profit and low-capital organisations under the purview of labour protections, ensuring more inclusive coverage.

Employers Must Lead Skill Development, Says Sridhar Vembu



HYDERABAD

Zoho's chief scientist Sridhar Vembu on Sunday argued that employers must take on a far bigger role in building skills as college degrees drift further away from job-market needs. Responding to a report on China's looming employment crunch, Vembu wrote on X, I believe the solution is for employers to play a far more active role in skill development. College education decoupled from work is expensive, wastes time and resources and does not suit the vast majority of students. Vembu's post came after the South China Morning Post reported that China is bracing for 12.7 million graduates entering a tight job market in 2026. The report described a deepening structural imbalance: China's labour market suffers from a structural talent shortage: many young people struggle to find jobs that meet their expectations, while factories often find it difficult to recruit qualified

technicians. Economist Liu Yuan-chun added that the number of university graduates would continue rising and could exceed 16 million by 2038, further widening the gap. LoginRadius CEO Rakesh Soni said the rapid shift driven by automation had outpaced traditional training models. Employers stepping up on skill building is important, especially as AI reshapes the work. But it feels like knowledge work is automating faster than we can train, and maybe we're chasing the wrong finish line, especially looking at 2038, he wrote. He questioned whether economies should begin redesigning work itself. If real employment pressure hits, why not pivot to 4-day weeks, then 6-hour days, and so on, until AI handles the grind and we all get UBI to chase what truly sparks joy? What's your take on the endgame here? Not just China, a debate over a talent gap is also growing in India.

Seven of India's Top Companies add ₹1.28 Lakh Crore

MUMBAI

The combined market valuation of seven of India's top-10 most valued companies surged by more than ₹1.28 lakh crore last week, supported by a broadly positive trend in domestic equities. Investor sentiment remained upbeat, with the BSE Sensex advancing 669.14 points, or 0.79 per cent, and the Nifty50 rising 0.61 per cent during the week. Most heavyweight stocks posted healthy increases in market capitalisation, reflecting sustained investor confidence across key sectors such as energy, banking, information technology and FMCG.

Reliance Industries and Bharti Airtel were among the standout performers, with Airtel recording a strong jump of ₹36,579.01 crore, taking its valuation to ₹12,33,279.85 crore. IT majors also contributed significantly to the overall gains. Infosys added ₹17,490.03 crore, lifting its market capitalisation to ₹6,41,688.83 crore, while Tata Consultancy Services (TCS) registered an increase of ₹16,299.49 crore, pushing its valuation to ₹11,39,715.66 crore. Banking giants HDFC Bank and State Bank of India also witnessed notable increases. HDFC Bank rose by



₹14,608.22 crore to reach ₹15,35,132.56 crore, reaffirming its position as the most

valued bank. State Bank of India gained ₹4,846.08 crore, taking its valuation to

₹8,97,769.87 crore. In the FMCG sector, Hindustan Unilever Limited (HUL) saw its market capitalisation rise by ₹1,785.69 crore to ₹5,71,972.75 crore. However, the upbeat market mood did not extend to all frontline companies. Bajaj Finance emerged as the biggest loser of the week, as its valuation slipped by ₹8,244.79 crore to ₹6,25,328.59 crore. Life Insurance Corporation of India (LIC) lost ₹4,522.38 crore, falling to ₹5,70,578.04 crore, while ICICI Bank recorded a smaller decline of ₹1,248.08 crore, bringing its market capitalisation to ₹9,79,126.35 crore.

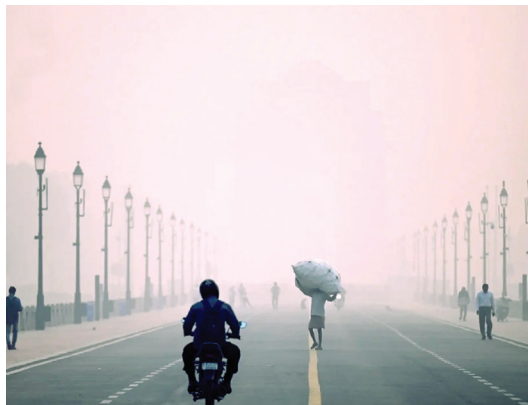

Climate change is no longer a distant scientific hypothesis; it has become an immediate, lived reality. Its severity is starkly revealed in the Climate India 2025 report by the Centre for Science and Environment (CSE) and Down To Earth.

From January to September 2025, India faced some form of extreme weather—floods, droughts, heavy rainfall, storms, cold waves, or deadly heat—on 99% of the days. In the same period, 4,064 lives were lost, 9.47 million hectares of crops destroyed, 58,982 livestock perished, and 99,533 houses collapsed. Agriculture has suffered the deepest wounds, as rising temperatures and erratic rainfall directly disrupt crops, soil moisture, and farming cycles. Rural economies are reeling under unprecedented stress.

In Himachal Pradesh alone, extreme weather struck on 257 days, while Madhya Pradesh recorded 532 deaths and Maharashtra saw 8.4 million hectares of crops damaged. Clearly, this is not merely an environmental concern—it is a grave crisis impacting human life, health, economic stability, and national prosperity.

At least 18 states and Union Territories recorded their highest number of extreme-weather days since 2022. From February to September 2025, for eight consecutive months, 30 or more states witnessed uninterrupted extreme weather events. What India is facing today mirrors the global situation. The years 2023, 2024, and 2025 have been among the hottest ever recorded.

An impending disaster

Europe's unending heatwaves, famine in Africa's Sahel region, wildfires in the Amazon and Australia, violent cyclones across the Pacific and Atlantic, and rapidly melting glaciers—all point to a planet hurtling toward a dangerous tipping point. Disrupted weather cycles, rising sea levels, sudden temperature spikes, and unpredictable rainfall are not only intensifying natural disasters but also rendering human life increasingly unsafe.

Who's responsible?

The core cause behind this planetary disturbance is human behaviour: unchecked

industrialization, dependence on fossil fuels, deforestation, pollution, unplanned cities, and reckless consumption. These actions have pushed greenhouse gas concentrations to perilous levels, overheating the Earth and destabilizing its climate system.

Health risks

The consequences now touch every sphere of life. Health risks are rising sharply; heatwaves are claiming more lives, pollution-induced diseases are increasing, and new viruses are emerging. Water resources are depleting as rivers and groundwater dry up. Food security is under threat as crop failures grow, pushing up prices of essen-

warnings, the global response remains inadequate. Developed nations continue to evade their historical responsibility.

In recent years, the irresponsible stance of leaders like US President Donald Trump—who repeatedly undermined global climate commitments—has further weakened international efforts. Many rich countries are openly disregarding the Paris Agreement and its essential recommendations.

Need for global emission reductions

Sunita Narain, Director General of CSE, rightly observed that India must now focus not merely on counting di-

tial grains and vegetables. Economies are staggering under the weight of repeated natural disasters, millions are being displaced, and inequality is widening. If the world fails to limit global warming to 1.5°C, the next three decades could see erratic Himalayan rivers, sinking coastal cities, and widespread human distress.

Climate change and human health

Another alarming warning comes from The Lancet Countdown on Health and Climate Change 2025. According to its findings, climate-related factors caused a 66% decline in agricultural productivity and a 20% loss in the construction sector last year. Excessive heat alone resulted in an estimated \$194 billion loss in potential earnings. The report, prepared by 128 international experts from 71 academic institutions and UN agencies, offers the most comprehensive assessment yet of the links between climate change and human health.

It highlights that between 2020 and 2024, India recorded an average of 10,000 deaths annually linked to wildfire-generated PM2.5 pollution—a 28% increase compared to 2003–2012. These figures should shake our collective conscience. Yet, in spite of such alarming

sasters but on understanding the scale at which climate change is unfolding. She stressed the urgent need for global emission reductions, emphasizing that no amount of adaptation can match the magnitude of these rapidly multiplying disasters.

Citizen's participation

CSE Programme Director Kiran Pandey, warned that rising temperatures during the monsoon could trigger even more intense and unpredictable weather events.

Richard Mahapatra, Managing Editor of Down To Earth, cautioned that without decisive mitigation, today's disasters will soon become "the new normal." In such times, responsibility cannot be left to governments and international bodies alone. Every citizen must become a participant in environmental protection. We must reshape our lifestyles to align with nature. Simple, everyday actions—saving energy, using water responsibly, reducing plastic use, planting trees, segregating waste, and recycling—can create transformative results. Rainwater harvesting, solar power, composting, and minimizing unnecessary consumption strengthen environmental resilience. Choosing public transport, reducing vehicle use, walking, and cycling are powerful steps toward combating climate change.



Conquer diabetes not just with medicine, but with a balanced life

Moderate, mindful eating is perhaps the sim-

plest and most effective medicine.

Diabetes is spreading rapidly in India and across the world—affecting both young and old alike. Once considered a disease of middle age, it is now gripping children and youth as well. In India alone, nearly 100 million people are living with diabetes, while 440 million are affected worldwide. India's prevalence rate has reached 11.5%, with 15.3% of the population at a pre-diabetic stage—meaning one in every ten Indians is at risk. Globally, it is estimated that by 2050, more than 850 million people will be living with diabetes.

To prevent and manage diabetes, regular physical activity is the key. Morning walks, light exercise, jogging, or cycling keep the body active and help stabilize blood glucose levels. Additionally, yoga and meditation have proven to be extremely beneficial in diabetes control. Yoga not only strengthens the body but calms the mind and reduces stress. Practices like pranayama, anulom-vilom, kapalbhati, and bhramari help regulate insulin secretion and bring mental stability. Stress and depression are hidden enemies of diabetes. When the mind is under pressure, cortisol and other stress hormones rise, increasing blood sugar levels. Thus, maintaining mental calmness and happiness is as crucial as physical health.

While the Corona crisis gave students an efficient option to study through online education, it also made them victims of digital addiction. Parents thought the children were busy with online learning, but a large number of them remained addicted to online games.

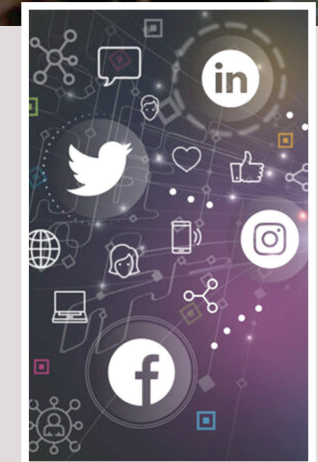
In recent times, children have become increasingly addicted to digital media and lifestyle changes. But they thought it was normal. If their parents prevent them

from doing so, they will not tolerate it. Their behavior also seems to be aggressive.

Somewhere, there were cases of students committing suicide after their parents.

Govt actions

In Kerala alone, the tragic news of 41 children committing suicide in four years has put administration and parents to sleep. The Government of Kerala takes new initiatives to free children from digital addiction. Six D-addiction Centres have been started in Palakkad, which provide counselling for children. The psychologists present here do an Internet addiction test for children who are addicted, to



find out what their level is. On the basis of which remedial measures are advised. There are 10-15 sessions of one hour during this time. It's nice to see positive results after four or five sessions.

In fact, it's hard to tell digital addicts that they are. They don't even want to admit they are doing something unusual. This behavior is normal for them. But after counseling and a few sessions at the addiction center, they think something is wrong.

The 'aggressive' outcome

In fact, the social media network is grazing our society so fast that kids don't even think they are doing anything unusual, which causes teenagers to act aggressively when they stop it. In some cases, they begin to become depressed or even have suicidal thoughts. It is pleasing that over the last two years, twelve and a half hundred children have been freed from digital addiction. Children are feeling mentally healthy.

Need for joint remedial measures

In fact, today's need is for teachers and parents to try to balance learning and internet use. In fact, this crisis is not just one district of Kerala but the whole country, which the Central Government needs to make policy and open a de-addiction centre as soon as possible. Positive results can be achieved in this direction with the cooperation of Centre and States. Volunteer organisations can also play an important role in this work.

Actor Sunny Hinduja paid a heartfelt tribute on Sunday to legendary Indian spy Ravindra Kaushik, as his TV series Adrishya completed 11 years. Sunny had portrayed Kaushik in one of the show's most memorable episodes, and he marked the occasion by sharing an emotional video on Instagram.

In the video, Sunny recalled Kaushik's extraordinary journey from a talented theatre artist to one of India's most successful undercover spies. Recruited by RAW at just 23, Kaushik spent two years erasing his identity, mastering Urdu and Islamic culture. In 1975, he crossed into Pakistan under his new identity, Nabi Ahmed Shakir. His brilliance earned him the title "The Black Tiger", personally given by the then Prime Minister.

Kaushik's achievements were remarkable. He completed an LLB degree in Pakistan, entered the Military Accounts Department, and eventually rose to the rank of Major. Until 1983, he sent crucial military intelligence back to India. His mission ended when a low-level contact was caught and revealed his identity. Arrested and tortured, Kaushik's death sentence was later changed to life imprisonment. He spent 16 years in Pakistani jails, secretly sending letters to his family, before dying in 2001.

Prabhas' action drama 'Spirit' begins grand journey



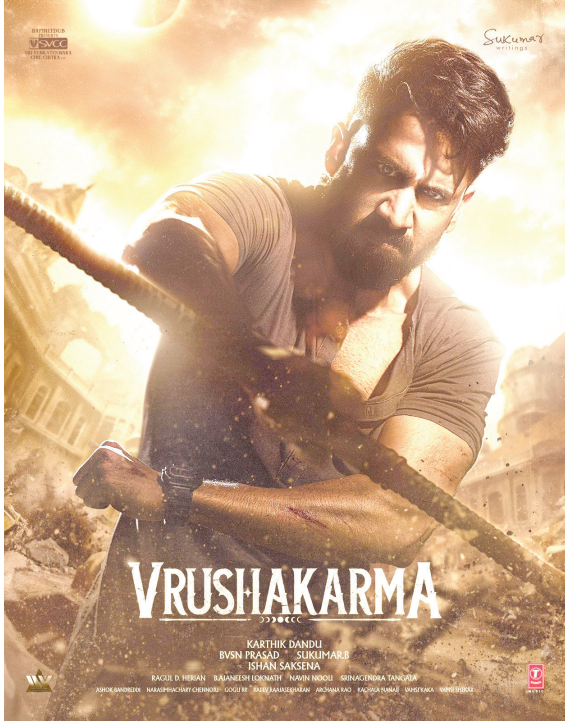

Opting to bowl, India controlled the contest from the outset, restricting Nepal to 114 for 5, a total that featured just one boundary — a testament to the bowling unit's discipline and precision.

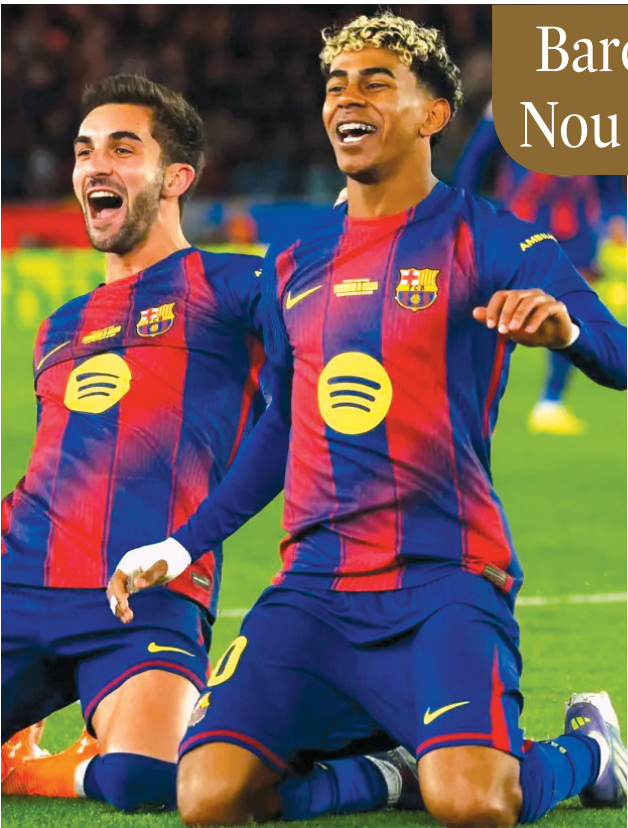
In response, India made light work of the chase, cruising to 117 for 3 in only 12 overs. Phula Saren anchored the innings with an assured 44 not out, ensuring the team never lost momentum. Her composed knock provided the backbone to India's authority in a final they dominated from start to finish. India's



path to the title included a convincing victory over Australia in the first semifinal, while Nepal entered the final after defeating Pakistan in the second semifinal on Saturday. Hosts Sri Lanka endured a difficult campaign, managing just a single win — against the USA — in the prelimi-

nary stage. The six-team tournament also witnessed remarkable individual performances. Pakistan's Mehreen Ali, classified as a B3 partially sighted player, emerged as the standout batter, amassing more than 600 runs. Her extraordinary tally included a blistering 230 off 78 balls

against Sri Lanka and a superb 133 against Australia, underlining her dominance throughout the competition. India's triumph not only marks a milestone for the team but also signals a significant moment for the growth and recognition of blind women's cricket worldwide.



Barcelona mark emotional Camp Nou return with emphatic 4-0 win

BARCELONA

Barcelona inaugurated their rebuilt Camp Nou in style, ending a two-and-a-half-year exile with a commanding 4-0 victory over Athletic Bilbao that lifted them level with Real Madrid at the top of La Liga. The occasion, long delayed due to construction setbacks, drew more than 45,000 supporters despite steep ticket prices, as fireworks and festivities set the stage for a memorable homecoming. Robert Lewandowski opened the scoring inside four minutes, capitalising on a high press led by Eric Garcia to fire past Unai Simón at the near post. The Basque goalkeeper, who got a touch on the ball, could not prevent the veteran striker from netting his eighth

league goal of an injury-disrupted season. Barcelona doubled their advantage on the stroke of half-time through Ferran Torres, who finished clinically after Lamine Yamal released him with a deft outside-of-the-boot pass. Coach Hansi Flick hailed the night as "a dream come true", praising his side's intensity, clean sheet and the emotional significance of returning home. Goalkeeper Joan Garcia, back after a nine-game injury absence, contributed to Barcelona's first shutout since September. Early in the second half, Fermin Lopez added a third after another aggressive high press from Garcia. Athletic's frustration mounted when Oihan Sancet was sent off following a VAR review for a rash foul on Lopez.

Hockey India offers free entry for FIH Men's Junior World Cup in Tamil Nadu

Fans can book their virtual tickets at no cost through the Ticketgenie website or the Hockey India mobile app. Once registered, spectators will receive a digital ticket, ensuring a smooth, paperless entry system and eliminating the need for physical collection. The move aims to draw larger crowds, especially young fans, students, and families eager to witness top-tier junior hockey action.

Calling the decision historic, Hockey India President Dr. Dilip Tirkey said the initiative reflects the federation's commitment to making international hockey more accessible. "This is a historic moment for Indian hockey, and we want every fan to be part

of it. Free tickets open the gates for students, young athletes, families, and hockey lovers across Tamil Nadu and beyond," he said. Tirkey added that the passion of Indian fans has always been a driving force for the sport.

Hockey India Secretary General Bhola Nath Singh echoed the sentiment, emphasising the importance of creating an electrifying atmosphere as Tamil Nadu hosts the Junior World Cup for the first time. All matches will be streamed live on JioHotstar, allowing fans nationwide to follow the action as the world's best young players compete for top honours.

England 'amateurish' if they skip pink-ball warm-up, warns Vaughan

LONDON

Former Ashes-winning captain Michael Vaughan has criticised England's preparation plans ahead of the second Test in Brisbane, insisting it would be "amateurish" not to stage a dedicated pink-ball warm-up under lights. England were thrashed inside two days in the series opener in Perth, leaving them trailing 0-1 with a long gap until the next match on December 4. Vaughan said the innings defeat should prompt England to urgently rethink their schedule. While the visitors are due to play a Prime Minister's XI on November 29, the fixture is set to feature England Lions rather than the

Test XI. Vaughan argued that the senior squad must take the initiative and arrange a two-day practice match of their own under floodlights to acclimatise to pink-ball conditions. "It's amateurish if England don't go out and practise between now and then," Vaughan told Test Match Special. "What harm is it playing two days of cricket with the pink ball under lights? You go and grab it, take it, and give yourself the best chance." England's concerns are compounded by Australia's formidable pink-ball record. The hosts have won 13 of their 14 day-night Tests, including all three previous encounters against England.

The Ajit Agarkar-led selection committee opted for continuity in leadership, entrusting Rahul with the role de-

For Rahul, India's dependable crisis-solver, the series offers another chance to deliver as he has so often before. He last captained in a 2023 ODI series in South Africa, steering India to a 2-1 win. Now, as first-choice wicketkeeper and No. 5, he can reaffirm his leadership.

spite Rohit being part of the squad. India will host the ODIs in Ranchi on November 30, Raipur on December 3, and Visakhapatnam on December 6.

All-rounder Ravindra Jadeja has been recalled after missing the recent Australia tour, replacing Axar Patel, who is likely being rested. Ruturaj Gaikwad also returns to the ODI side after recovering from injury, bolstering India's top-order options.

With a blend of experience and youth, India will look to fine-tune their combinations as they build towards a busy 2026 season.

LAKSHYA SEN ends title drought with commanding Australian Open triumph

SYDNEY

Lakshya Sen rediscovered his winning rhythm on Sunday, clinching the Australian Open Super 500 title with a fluent and authoritative straight-games victory over Japan's Yushi Tanaka. The 24-year-old Indian dispatched the world No.26 opponent 21-15, 21-11 in just 38 minutes, sealing his first crown of the season and his biggest title since 2024.

The win also makes him only the second Indian shuttler to secure a BWF World Tour title this year, following Ayush Shetty's maiden Super 300 triumph at the US Open.

For Lakshya, the week in Sydney marked a decisive turnaround after a lean period following his fourth-place finish at the Paris Olympics. His last title had come at the Syed Modi International in 2024, while his most recent top-tier success was the Canada Open the same year.

On Sunday, however, he was in complete control, celebrating the victory with his trademark gesture — fingers pressed to his ears.

Tanaka, who had won two Super 300 tournaments earlier this season, struggled to match Lakshya's precision. The Indian quickly built early leads in both games, capitalising on a string of Japanese errors and maintaining relentless pressure through crisp net play, sharp placement and flat, fast returns. A sizeable Indian contingent in the stands added to his momentum, chanting his name during key intervals.

Lakshya's tactical clarity stood out throughout the contest. He repeatedly denied Tanaka the depth required to unleash his powerful smashes, forcing rushed shots and unforced errors.

Once ahead, he accelerated confidently, producing a series of cross-court winners, backhand smashes and pinpoint drives to keep the Japanese shuttler on the defensive. With this victory, Lakshya joins a small group of Indian players to make deep runs this season, alongside Satwiksairaj Rankireddy-Chirag Shetty and Kidambi Srikanth, who all finished runners-up at various events. The Australian Open win, though, firmly re-establishes Lakshya as one of India's leading contenders heading into the 2026 season.

Verstappen triumphs in Las Vegas as Norris extends title lead with P2

LAS VEGAS

Red Bull's Max Verstappen clinched victory at the Las Vegas Grand Prix, while McLaren's Lando Norris strengthened his championship bid with a composed drive to second place under the floodlights.

The result extends Norris's lead over teammate Oscar Piastri to 30 points with two races and a sprint remaining in the 2025 Formula One season.

Verstappen, a four-time world champion, controlled the race from the front, delivering a measured performance to keep the McLarens and Mercedes at bay. His win keeps him mathematically in the title fight, moving him to 366 points—42 behind Norris—with a maximum of 58 still available.

Norris, starting from the front row, managed his tyres well through the high-degradation conditions on the Las Vegas Strip Circuit, ensuring he stayed clear of the battles

unfolding behind him. His second-place finish boosts his tally to 408 points and places him firmly in charge of the championship picture ahead of the penultimate round in Qatar.

George Russell secured third for Mercedes, marking a strong return to the podium for last year's Las Vegas winner. The British driver benefited from consistent pace and clean execution in a race marked by strategic variation throughout the field.

Oscar Piastri crossed the line fourth but was handed a five-second penalty after an incident involving Mercedes rookie Kimi Antonelli. The penalty, however, did not affect his finishing position, leaving him on 378 points—still Norris's closest challenger but now needing a strong weekend in Qatar to stay within striking distance.



With two grands prix left and the added points from a sprint still in play, the title fight remains open. But as the paddock heads to Lusail, the momentum—and the advantage—firmly belongs to Lando Norris.
